Phonic Screening Check

A huge WELL DONE to all of the Year I students who participated in their **Phonics Screening Check** this term. This year, our Phonics Screening Check saw an improvement of 43% when compared to our 2021 data. Also, a big congratulations to our junior primary teachers and intervention educators, for ensuring our Year I students achieved their very best.

The Phonics Screening Check is a simple assessment that tells teachers how their students are progressing in phonics. The Phonics Screening Check is a national check that is administered to all Year I students in Australia.








Sage is a Tier 2 small group program which provides explicit instruction in phonemic awareness, synthetic phonics for reading and spelling, letter formation, and connected text reading.

SACE UPDATE

For students and families who are doing SACE there are some important due dates coming up. Next term, external tasks in all subjects are due for Year 12s at the end of Week 2, and for Year 11 students at the end of Week 4. Because the work is sent to be checked outside of the school there are no extensions for these due dates. It so important that students are at school, working steadily and when they get stuck, ask for help! We will give each family an update on how their child is progressing with their SACE at SACE and Career Counselling, Wednesday 19th October (Term 4, Week 1).


If your child isn't in SACE yet, here is a really important reminder about what SACE is and what your child's senior years at school might look like. When students are in Year 10 to Year 12 they study Australian Curriculum subjects then SACE subjects. SACE stands for South Australian Certificate of Education. It is a formal qualification students get by completing Years 10, 11 and 12. SACE is designed to help students develop skills and knowledge to live, work, and take part successfully in a changing society.

Students need to achieve 200 credits over 3 years and there are 6 requirements:

- I. PLP (you, your skills)
- 2. Essential English
- 3. Essential Maths (useful everyday skills)
- 4. RP (your interests)
- 90 credits at Stage I (8/9 subjects / a course)
- 6. 60 credits at Stage 2(3 subjects / or 1 major course)

At Kaurna Plains, we structure our SACE program around student's strengths, interests, community opportunities and Culture, Language and student's identity.

KAURNA LANGUAGE UPDATE

Even though this term has been full of events, excursions, and an amazing camp, we have still been able to keep up with our Kaurna Language lessons.

Here's a short update of some of the things that students have been learning. At the end of this term we have tried to move from learning words and phrases to starting to learn more about writing sentences.

Students in Reception/I have started learning our school song in Kaurna, and have even learnt about making new words in Kaurna. They learnt words for places in this picture and started to learn about the concept of how different languages have different 'rules'.

Students in Year 2 to Year 6 learnt about some grammar rules and the suffixes / word endings like *-ana*. This shows that we are going *towards* somewhere. The students also heard stories about Kaurna skies and learnt about some of the constellations, stories, seasons and more.

The senior students have been learning about grammar structures and word endings like *-ana toward* and also the way to say *on*, *at* or *l*, which is *-ngka* for 2 syllable words and *-ila* for 3 syllable words. They also learnt about some ways to translate things literally and some less simple ways to translate words. They will build up to translate a sentence from their favourite songs!

YEAR 4,5,6 CLASS

Term 3 work in our class

What a great term we have had! In Science, our class have been to outer space exploring all the different planets and moons within our solar system. We have heard Dreaming Stories from a range of Indigenous groups about different planets and constellations. Using all of this information, we created our own multimodal information reports.

We have continued to learn new language with Uncle Antony - learning place names such as Kukuwardli (hospital), Titawardli (shop), Maiwardli (restaurant), Piipawardli (school) and Wardli (home). Next term we are going to start looking at full sentences in Kaurna Language.

SATURN

For Maths, we explored the language of probability and chance and plotted different events on the chance continuum. We then explored data through our attendance data – graphing our own class attendance data and our individual student data using bar and line graphs.

We have started working with Ground Force again for 2023, as part of our Arts curriculum. Ground Force are a dance studio who work with classes to learn choreography, practice and perform a hip-hop dance routine.

We are excited to refine our dance, ready for the end of year performance next term.

Our Stories Excursion

On Friday 2nd September, our class and Aunty Kiara's class were invited to listen to some Dreaming stories from three Elder Aunties. We arrived at the Adelaide Festival Centre and walked into the theatre to see a beautiful campfire set up and the Aunties waiting ready for us. They shared stories from their people and even asked us to perform the Acknowledgement of Country.

Camp

Our class were so excited to FINALLY go on camp! We had been waiting and worrying that camp may not go ahead, after the disappointment of postponing in Term I! For many of our students (and even our teacher), this was their first experience of camp. Below are some of the favourite parts of camp from students in the Year 4, 5, 6 class.

Since returning from camp, we have been lucky enough to have women from the AFLW



MIDDLE YEARS

In HASS the Year 9 and 10 students have been learning about sustainable tourism ventures.

Sustainability is the ability to maintain something at a certain rate or level. Sustainability is important for the natural environment and for local economies.

Tourism is seeing or doing something for the purpose of pleasure in an unfamiliar area. Some examples of tourism include staying somewhere like a hotel or caravan park, eating somewhere like a restaurant or café, seeing something like a national park or native animals.

Creating tourism ventures that are sustainable means we can showcase the unique and beautiful parts of our state in a way that supports the local economy and protects the native environment.

The task was split into 3 parts:

Step I: Defining project aims

- Students create a statement which articulates exactly what they are aiming to do as part of their tourism venture. Key to their description is an analysis of how their tourism venture fosters sustainability both environmentally and economically.
- Students also provide a profile of the tourists they will be looking to entice, for example, couples or families, domestic or international tourists.

Step 2: Defining the niche

- Students articulate what makes their region, place and or product special.
- Students explain why they think people will want to engage with their tourism venture by noting their point of difference from other operators, for example by explaining their environmental credentials or the unique opportunities they provide for tourists.

Step 3: Promotion

- Students create an Internet article for the SATC travel blog (from which they learned about sustainable tourism).
- Their article should aim to promote their tourism venture, focusing on the way in which the venture connects at least two of the Australian Curriculum's geographical concepts, such as place, space, environment, interconnection, sustainability, scale and change.
